



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	<p>Ivy <i>Eidhneán</i></p> <p>This Irish plant grows on the ground and will also climb trees, shrubs and walls. Its autumn flowers provide food for insects and its early black coloured berries provide food for birds.</p>	<p>When I found it</p> <p>Where I found it</p>
	<p>Daisy <i>Nóinín</i></p> <p>These flowers go to sleep at night! The pretty white petals fold in over the yellow center. You can make daisy chains out of them. 	<p>Gorse <i>Aiteann gallda</i></p> <p>Be careful, Gorse, also known as Furze, has sharp spiny leaves! It is found in many different places and has yellow pea-like flowers, which can be seen throughout the year.</p>	<p>When I found it</p> <p>Where I found it</p>
	<p>Groundsel <i>Grúnlas</i></p> <p>Groundsel flowers all year round on walls, in gardens and even in cracks on pavements. It was used by people to feed cage birds. Its seeds look like miniature dandelion clocks. The stem is hollow.</p>	<p>When I found it</p> <p>Where I found it</p>

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
